K-12 TEACHERS: LAST CALL TO APPLY FOR A BRIGHT IDEAS GRANT!

Time is running out for educators to apply for grants of up to \$2,000 from EnergyUnited's Bright Ideas education grant program. Friday, September 16 is the last day to submit an application for grant funding for creative, hands-on classroom projects. "The Bright Ideas education grant program has provided more than \$10 million for 9,800 projects benefitting more than 2 million students in our state over the past 22 years," said Maureen Moore, Communications Manager at EnergyUnited. EnergyUnited and electric cooperatives statewide expect to award nearly \$600,000 to educators for Bright Ideas projects during the 2016-17 school year. Last year, EnergyUnited awarded 47 teachers from 13 of the 19 counties they serve with over \$40,000 in Bright Ideas education grants that helped fund innovative classroom learning projects.

Bright Ideas grants are available to K-12 teachers for innovative projects in any subject. Applications require an outline of the proposed project, a detailed budget and a description of the benefit to students. Applicants are encouraged to highlight the innovative, creative elements of the project and to proofread carefully.

Classroom teachers at qualifying schools in EnergyUnited's 19 counties: Alexander, Cabarrus, Caldwell, Catawba, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Gaston, Guilford, Iredell, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, Montgomery, Randolph, Rockingham, Rowan, Stokes, Wilkes and Yadkin can apply for grants individually or as a team. North Carolina's electric cooperatives serve more than 2.5 million people in 93 of the state's 100 counties.
