

HOME SAFE HOME

WE'VE ROUNDED UP OUR TOP SAFETY TIPS IN HONOR OF NATIONAL ELECTRICAL SAFETY MONTH.

INDOORS



- Check electric cords for fraying or cracking. Replace cords that may be damaged, and don't overload electrical outlets.
- Remember extension cords are intended to be temporary; they are not intended as permanent household wiring.
- Don't run cords under carpets or rugs and don't tack or nail cords to walls or floors.
- Keep electric appliances and tools away from water. Never reach for or unplug an appliance that has fallen into water; instead, turn the power off at the breaker before you unplug the appliance or remove it from the water.
- Never put anything other than an electrical plug in an outlet.
 Use outlet covers or caps to protect children.
- Keep your home's electrical system in good repair. Contact a licensed electrical contractor if you have flickering lights, sparks, nonfunctioning outlets, or need wiring repairs or upgrades.

OUTDOORS

- Never touch downed power lines!
- Always call your local utility or 911 if you see lines down.
- Watch for overhead lines every time you use a ladder, work on roofs or trees, or carry long tools or loads. Keep kites, model airplanes and metallic balloons away from power lines.
- Know what's below before you dig. At least three days before starting any digging or excavating project, call 811, the National One Call Center, to have underground utility lines, pipes and cables marked for free.
- Avoid planting trees underneath power lines or near utility equipment.

SUMMER GRILLING SAFETY

Grilling is a great way to enjoy time outdoors in the warmer months. Need a refresher on some grilling 101? We've got you covered. Check out our eight grill safety tips below to keep your spring and summer grilling safe and fun.

Grill outside and away from any structures: the NFPA reports that more than one-quarter (27%) of home fires started by outdoor grills began in a courtyard, terrace or patio.

Make sure your grill is stable and on a flat surface.

Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from both the grill and the tray below the grill.

Check for propane leaks: Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose and then turn on the gas. If there is a propane leak, the solution will bubble. Other signs of a propane leak include the smell of gas near the barbecue or a flame that won't light. Nervous about performing this task? Call us, we'll be happy to help.

If the flame goes out, wait to relight: If you are using a gas grill and the flame goes out, turn the grill and the gas off, then wait at least five minutes to relight it.

Never leave a lit grill unattended.

Wear the right clothing: Clothing can easily catch fire, so be sure your shirttails, sleeves or apron strings don't dangle over the grill.

Be ready to put out a fire: Have baking soda on hand to control a grease fire and a fire extinguisher nearby for other fires. Never use water to put out a grease fire.
