

## **EnergyUnited Candidate Nomination Information**

Candidate nomination materials now available for districts 1, 2 and 3

EnergyUnited EMC is accepting nominations from eligible candidates in districts 1, 2 and 3 who are interested in running to serve on the cooperative's board of directors.

Petition forms and information are available on our board of directors' webpage. Members may also call 1-800-522-3793 or go to any EnergyUnited office to request materials. The petition materials include information about the nominations for the 2018 election, sample petition for collecting member signatures, an official signature petition form for collecting member signatures and an affidavit.

Members seeking nomination for EnergyUnited Board of Director positions are required by cooperative bylaws to do so through a petition process. Verifiable signatures from at least ½ of 1% of members who live within the nominee's board district or have designated a voting residence within that district are required. The member petition must contain the names, addresses and original dated signatures. All signatures must be dated within 60 days of the first signature.

Completed petition materials must be received on or before Thursday, June 14 2018 at 5:00 p.m. EST at the headquarter office located at 567 Mocksville Highway in Statesville, NC.

Running for a seat on the board and voting in EnergyUnited elections is a distinctive benefit of being a cooperative member. Directors are democratically elected by the EnergyUnited membership and are compensated for their service. The cooperative has three directors from each of its three board districts. Directors serve three-year terms.

The Nominations Committee composed of members will verify nominees' qualifications. After petition signatures and nominees qualifications are verified, EnergyUnited will announce the newly elected directors at its Annual Meeting of Members on September 20, 2018.
