One way EU and participating members demonstrate a shared commitment to community is through our Operation Round-Up program. We are grateful for the 70,000 electric members who agree to round up their bills each month. Their support helps to serve community members in need—members like Brigette Parsons.

In 2013, Brigette Parsons was balancing her role as a single mother with a typical nine-to-five job. Inspiration struck and a need within the community became increasingly evident. By that October, she began Saving Grace K9s, a nonprofit to help disabled military veterans who suffer from PTSD/TBI (post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury) reenter into civilian life with the help of a service dog.

"At the beginning, it was tough. I had no experience with dog training, didn't know how to run a nonprofit, and really had no idea where to start," Brigette says. But like many things that appear fated, things fell into place. She met dog trainer Kat Carter while shopping. They hit it off and together they came up with a training plan. By December 2014 the team had their first graduate of the program, who, as fate would have it, would later become Brigette's husband.

The program places rescue dogs with veterans who suffer from PTSD/TBI and light mobility issues over a six- to eightmonth training regimen. Bonding and camaraderie are often what veterans miss the most when reentering civilian life, and with a service dog, they know that man's best friend will always have their back.

"This Operation Round-Up donation is so important to the well-being of our program and the veterans we serve. Without funding we can't save lives."

"\$10,000 may not be a lot to some people, but to us, a donation like this is the difference between life and death. It's huge." Brigette continues, "I struggle to find the words to describe it except to say that it literally is lifesaving. I am so thankful to have this donation from EnergyUnited so we can continue our mission and help these men and women reclaim a life they can love."


