TEACHERS: BEING A BRIGHT IDEAS EARLY BIRD COULD WIN YOU \$100

STATESVILLE, N.C. - North Carolina's electric cooperatives, including EnergyUnited, are accepting applications for Bright Ideas education grants to fund creative, classroom-based learning projects. The final deadline to apply is Friday, September 18, but teachers who submit their application by the 'early bird' deadline of Friday, August 14 will be entered for a chance to win one of five \$100 gift cards. These winners will be notified, and recognized on the Bright Ideas website and Facebook page at www.facebook.com/ncbrightideas.

Teachers can apply for Bright Ideas grants of up to \$2,000, which is part of \$600,000 in Bright Ideas funding that will be awarded to teachers statewide during the 2015-2016 school year. Classroom teachers at qualifying schools in EnergyUnited's 19 counties: Alexander, Cabarrus, Caldwell, Catawba, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Gaston, Guilford, Iredell, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, Montgomery, Randolph, Rockingham, Rowan, Stokes, Wilkes and Yadkin can apply for grants individually or as a team. Last year, EnergyUnited awarded over \$40,000 to 27 teachers and plans to fund a similar amount again this year. The grant recipients use the money to fund creative, hands-on classroom projects that fall outside traditional school budgets.
